This Power Point is about... the word class: NOUNS

"WORD CLASS" means describing the types of word in a sentence

Look at this example:

The huge spider silently crept across its silvery web.

Each word in this sentence does a job. It belongs to a WORD CLASS.

NOUNS

The huge spider silently crept across its silvery web.

The words highlighted in yellow are NOUNS. They describe an object, thing or feeling.

There are 4 main types of noun. Think of them as two sets of pairs:

Proper Noun	Common Noun
person or place e.g. London, Mr Wilson, Jupiter (notice that proper nouns have capital letters)	a general object or thing e.g. city, man, planet
Concrete Noun	Abstract Noun
Concrete Noun something you can see, touch, touch, hear or smell e.g. apple, computer, road	Abstract Noun something that is hard to see or touch, but you can often feel it e.g love, truth, friendship



Some nouns are called COLLECTIVE NOUNS.

A collective noun describes a group of people or things as a whole.

The flock of birds flew high over the village.

The team won the Middleton Cup for the second year.

There are many unusual COLLECTIVE NOUNS to describe groups of animals.

A swarm of bees.

A school of fish.

A knot of snakes.

A murder of crows.

Remember

Words can belong to different WORD CLASSES. It depends on what job they are doing in the sentence.

Last night I went to the theatre to see a play called 'The Double'.

verb

When I was little, I loved to play with my train set.
